

Over the last year groups within the District, have again taken part in a great number of events and competitions held at both district and county level, this year's District Climbing Competition, for the Cubs, Scout and Explorer sections proved to be very popular, with over 76 young people taking part over two nights, my thanks go to the Staff at the Marine Activities Centre Sunderland for making helping make this a great event for the young people taking part. Top three in each section went on to represented the District in the County Climbing Completion, This year Sunderland managed to winner all three youth sections, the Cubs also managed 3rd place, Scouts 2nd place with the Explorers also managing a 2nd place on the day, well done to all.

Again this year the District has two places on Sail Training being offered by the Priestman Trust, one going to St Andrews Sea Scouts the other is being taken up by a member of Vaux Own Explorers. I am sure both will have a great time on what is a trip of a life time.

International – Explorers from Vaux Own Explorers taking part in the IX09 expedition in the Northern province of Zambia last July/August had a life changing experience, with Explorers and Network members from Cleveland and members of the Northumberland and Durham Girls

Brigade they were building a classroom at the Kapisha Middle Basic School on the Shiwa Ng'andu estate in the Chinsali District. After 48 hrs travelling, the last part being 1000 km my bus along the dusty roads of Zambia for 12 hours to reach the campsite at Kapishya. Joining the UK members were also members from the Zambian Scouts and Girls Brigade. Great fun was had by all, the Building had grown in size from the planed 19m x 6m to 25m x 6.5m. 30,000 bricks need moving 1000m, B & Q was only 250 km away, only a problem when you run out of nails. After three weeks of hard work, they did not quite finish the School which was disappointing. It was up to roof level, with half the roof sheets in place when they left for home. Within weeks of returning home the local builders who had being working the group had finished the School and it is now being



use by the young people of Kapisha, saving them a 35 km walk to school.

You don't need to go to Zambia to have a International camp, have your group thought of attend one of the many international camps that run in the UK each year? NO then contact me and I all the information on where and when these camps are held in 2010 & 2011, attending one of these camps will give your young people a great introduction to International Scouting.

Looking forward to 2011, its less than 440 days the 22nd World Scout Jamboree being held in Sweden, Durham County is sending 36 young people and four leaders, Sunderland will be represented by an

explorer from St John's explorers, one of the District Leaders is also part of the Jamboree planning team. Not everyone can attend the Jamboree, but all Groups can take part in the Join in Jamboree events that are being planned, do you have International and Global in your programmes. What about doing a Partnership award this year, this is the year to start these great activities in all sections.

As always, without leaders and helpers devoting the many hours of unseen work, Sunderland district would not be able to run the range of activities that are being run throughout the District on a weekly basis's. This is enabling our young people in all the sections not only to take part in the "The Big Adventure" but also be members of a World Wide Movement with 28 million members in 168 Counties. Therefore I would like to thank all those who have again given freely of they time over the last year.

IX09 - Zambia

On a typical rainy English morning a group of Scouts and Girls Brigade left the North East, destination Africa. After a six hour coach journey from Fulwell to Heathrow the two years of planning and training had almost become a reality. We arrived in terminal three with time to spare, which was spent wisely raiding duty free shops, then when the time came we headed to our gate ready to board the plane.

After a sixteen hour flight and some awful airline meals we had finally arrived in Africa, we landed at around six o'clock in the morning at Nairobi airport in Kenya, and there we a had another plane to catch that would take us to Lusaka airport, but due to a problem with the plane we ended up with a comfy floor to sleep on, around four hours later our plane was ready to fly and we were on our way to our destination. We finally arrived in Lusaka airport after a short flight, we were greeted by the chief scout of Zambia and local press and then taken into the empty terminal, only one more obstacle to pass, our final border control desk. Once through border control we were able to meet the local Scouts who would be working and travelling with us, they quickly loaded our kit onto a coach and we were on our way. The local Zambians started singing and dancing in the coach trying to involve us, it was strange at first to say the least, but once we got to know the locals we would sing and dance the night away with them, they were just great fun. After another mammoth coach journey and a stop over at a campsite in Lusaka we finally arrived at Kapishya Hot Springs, our final destination, and once we set up camp and ate dinner, the fun and games began, singing, dancing and camp fire games, but we knew the hard work was ahead of us. The next morning it was the first day of work, one team was on domestics and the rest went to the building site, I was landed with domestics on the first day, and I just wanted to be at the building site all day, especially for the first day.

The building went great, we made it as fun as we possibly could by messing around but being safe at the same time, the days went fast, too fast, we arrived at the building site early morning, lunch arrived at noon then we ate until one, then we finished the day by building until four, when we arrived back at the camp site we sat down to tea for a while, then we parted ways either to the lodge or to the hot springs, but most nights ended up the same, straight to the hot springs then to the lodge all night then we went to sleep, still great fun though, because we could all have a laugh as a group of friends more than a group of work mates.

As the days went by the school became bigger and bigger and the team grew stronger, by then end of week two we had half a school, and it was time for some R & R, we spent 4 days on a walking safari, it was a fantastic trip and great to see wild animals in their natural habitat, we saw Lions at very close quarters, Hippo's and Buffalo, too many animals to mention!

Back to work and by the end of the trip we had managed to get the two classrooms at the School from slab to roof level and the roof on the first classroom, unfortunately the remoteness of the site and the difficulties in getting materials made it impossible to complete the roof before we left,

however the locals completed the school after we left and the local children are using it now.

This was a once in a life time opportunity, I would highly recommend a trip like this to anyone as it is a great experience, also I have made, and kept a lot of new friends and I would love to do it again.
